### Leesburg 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade / Lunch at Monk's Barbecue (04 July)

## **Simeone Auto Racing Museum “American Muscle” (08 July)**

On 8 July, a small group of ODCC members made the rather boring drive up I-95 to Philadelphia to visit the not-at-all boring Simeone Sports Car Racing Museum. Begun as one doctor’s private effort, this fabulous building houses a nearly complete history of sports car racing from its earliest days to the recent past.



Several times per year the Museum takes cars out of its collection into the large paved area behind the Museum and drives them, so that visitors can get a taste (and sound and smell) of these cars in action. In July, the special event was “*American Muscle, the American interpretation of the sports car: There’s no substitute for cubic inches.*” After a presentation on the history of large displacement sports cars, we got up close and personal with a 427 C2 Corvette, and got to watch that and other American performance cars driven in the back lot.



Aside from seeing that, we also spent time touring the entire collection of amazing cars, ranging from cars like a 1926 Bugatti to a Ford GT 40, a GT Mark IV, and a Porsche 917, all of which raced at LeMans.

# ODCC 34th Annual All Corvette Cruise-In (13 August)

The annual, signature event for the Old Dominion Corvette Club's charity fund raising efforts was held on Sunday, 13 August, at Bomnin Chevrolet in Manassas, Virginia. Once again, the project's Chairman and indispensable coordinator was Bill. In addition to months of preparation involving arrangements for supporting vendors, donations for the silent auction and door prizes, and recruitment of



ODCC volunteers, Bill also coordinated with Bomnin Chevrolet management. Gary was instrumental in developing a volunteer plan to ensure adequate support for every facet of the event from set-up, execution, and take down at the end of the day. Weeks before the event, Bill, Gary, and Chris (who would lead the parking team), met with Bomnin personnel to map out the event site for ingress and egress, registration, parking, canopy, and vendor placement, as well as music, and power requirements.

All these preparations resulted in a highly successful Cruise-In with over 100 Corvettes representing every generation, despite the exceptionally hot temperature. Vicki led the



Registration effort, ensuring a smooth entry for both pre-registered and day-of-the event arrivals. The silent auction enjoyed brisk sales with over 35 donated items purchased by event attendees. Paul and Cheryl led the 50/50 raffle ticket sales effort. As they did at last year's Cruise-In, they circulated through the crowd selling a record number of tickets. Kim was the happy winner of the 50/50 drawing.



This year, two new awards were initiated, the Dealer's Choice Award and the Celebrity Choice Award presented by Bomnin Chevrolet and Corvette Racing Team Driver, Tommy Milner respectively. Mark, a new ODCC member, won the Dealer's Choice Award with his beautiful 1962 C1 Corvette. The Dealer's Choice Award was won by a C2 Corvette.







Following the event, Gary asked the volunteers to complete a survey, with over 25% responding with comments for things that went well and suggestions for improvement. The Board reviewed the 195 comments received, including 123 recommendations, and is convening a committee to review and develop recommendations for our 35th Annual Cruise-In. The Board was delighted with the input received, reflecting sincere interest in this important event.

## Corvettes at Carlisle (25 – 27 August)

## ODCC News of Note

### Rudy Wins Best Decorated at Fourth of July Car Show

Independence Day ranks as my favorite holiday of the year, and that's why I enjoy decorating my C5 and participating in the Leesburg 4th of July parade. In addition to the parade, there is a local Front Royal show that happens that day. A local club, *The New Hot Rod Cruisers of Front Royal* (they're on Facebook), sponsors a show at the Skyline Ranch Resort, just three miles from my house. Among all of the other awards they advertised for the show was Best 4th of July Decorated. My only concern was making the 12:30 registration cut off while also participating in the Leesburg parade. That meant I had to finish the parade and skip the lunch at Monk's Barbecue so I could boogie it back to Front Royal in time. I made it with 15 minutes to spare.

Many of you have seen how my car was decorated that day (whether at the parade or in pictures). My car had coverings over the hood and rear hatch that I got from a company called Hood's Flags ([www.hoodsflags.com](http://www.hoodsflags.com)). They are really affordable and easy to install and remove. The rest of the car was all work done by me.

In total, I applied 52 stars in silver, blue, and white (I used silver and not red, because, well, my car is red). I created all of the stars using removable vinyl on my Cricut machine and computer.



The wheels were another story and a complete beast to do. I fortunately had the original wheels and tires for the car stowed away in the basement, and that allowed me to take my time decorating them. Once again, the Cricut machine came to my rescue, as I used it to rough-cut the 37 individual pieces needed for each wheel. Applying the vinyl and doing final trim took almost an hour and a half for each wheel. I learned as did each one, the next turning out better than the previous. When the time came, all I had to do was swap the wheels on to the car.



I had more items available that I could have used, but I was running out of energy that day. Enough about how I decorated the car, let's get on to the show details!

I've been to several shows at Skyline Ranch in the past, they are well organized, allow canopies, and there is a restaurant (and



restrooms) inside the resort building. There is always a DJ playing mostly oldies, along with a 50/50, and other usual show happenings. For awards, there is usually Top 30 (participant voting), along with Best of Show, Engine, Interior, and Paint (club officers select). Normally, if you win one of the *Best Of* awards, you are removed from the Top 30 so more people get awards. For this show there was also the Best Decorated First, Second, and Third place. I noticed that just about everyone who looked at my car was writing its number down on their voting sheet, so I was sure I would at least get a top 30. There were almost 60 cars there for the show that day. When award announcements started at 3, I waited anxiously. My number wasn't called during Top 30, I hoped that meant I scored a *Best Decorated*. They started with third place, nope, not me. Then came second place, once again, nope, not me. Finally, they announced *Best Decorated*, First Place, my number was called, and I was given a nice trophy for the win! Looking forward to doing both the parade and this show again next year.

## Membership Cards


Old Dominion Corvette Club is pleased to announce that our website now has the ability to create and download membership cards. The cards feature your name and member number, as well as your join and expiration date, as shown below. You'll be able to use this card at our sponsor Dealer to access membership benefits offered by Ted Britt Chevrolet. The Club also plans to reach out to other vendors to try to negotiate benefits for ODCC members. That will be a future activity, so stay tuned.



You can download this card from our website, and print a copy to carry in your wallet, or just download the image to your phone to display. It will (if you set the print options correctly, see below) print out to the size of a credit card. You could print it on card stock, or laminate it in plastic if you wish.

To download the card, you must be logged into our website with your user-id and password. (\*If you've forgotten your user-id or password, just click on the log-in link, then click on the "Forgot user-id or password" button. The site will email you the

information you need to log in.) Once logged in, move your mouse pointer to the top right of the browser window where your name is displayed, then click on "Profile" as shown below.



This will display your Member Profile Page, like below. Click on "Download Membership Card" and save it to your computer, tablet, or cell phone.




If you want to print it, there are a couple of things to note. Most image apps on Windows (and maybe Mac, I don't know about that) will try to print your card to fill up an entire page. That's going to be pretty hard to fit in

your wallet. You need to find the setting in the print dialog for your app or printer and tell it to print at 100%, or “Actual Size.”

Here’s how to do that with the Microsoft Paint app that comes installed on Windows computers. First, click on the *File* menu, then hover your mouse over the *Print* item (don't click it, just position the mouse pointer there). Next, click on “*Print Preview*” in the pane to the right.



Next, click on “*Page Setup*” in the toolbar at the top of the page, and click the circle button next to “*Adjust to 100%*” and click the OK button.



Finally, click the “*Print*” button on the toolbar.

If you're using another app, there should be a similar option to set the print size. Enjoy your “proof of membership”!

I hope these hints are helpful and that we have more members taking advantage of all the features our website offers to engage with your fellow ODCC members! Please let me know if you have any questions on how to navigate the website.

## **National Corvette Museum Tidbits**

If you have not been to the Museum, it needs to be on your bucket list. It includes continuously changing exhibitions, so even if you went a few years ago, a repeat visit will give you a brand new experience. Dennis and I first visited on an ODCC NCM Cruise back in 2021, and got to do it again when we did our R8C Museum Delivery of our new C8 last December (see the article “*Anniversary Surprise, NCM Museum Delivery Experience (aka Option R8C), and Assembly Plant Tour*” in the Winter 2022 Newsletter for the details of that experience). Although there were some exhibits that were the same, there were many new ones.

Routine exhibits include the Nostalgia Gallery that has Corvettes staged in era-appropriate settings; the Performance Gallery, with digital projections and touch screens paired with artifacts on display, 180 degree video footage, and an array of cars; and the Design and Engineering Gallery where you can learn the design history of this great car. There are also rotating exhibits. Currently, the NCM is offering a trip down Corvette’s memory lane with the exhibit “*An American Love Affair: 70 Years of Corvette*” and for those interested in the more exotic aspects of custom cars, “*Custom CARisma: The*

*Legendary Creations of Carl Casper*” showcasing some of his custom designs.



The NCM recently opened a new 2,000 square foot exhibit area called the McMichael Family Education Gallery. This space provides state of the art educational experiences geared toward the next generation of Corvette enthusiasts (and future owners), as well as engineers, designers, and others.

There are also some great online resources for those who want to learn more about Corvettes. They have a series of “*Vettecademy*” videos geared toward youngsters, and one called “*Fully Vetted*” for all Corvette enthusiasts that will give you history and insight into

Corvettes across the years. You can find links to both of these at [Educational Programs - National Corvette Museum](https://www.corvettemuseum.org/educational-programs/) (<https://www.corvettemuseum.org/educational-programs/>). (Hint, if you don’t know who Harley Earl is, how fiber glass first got used for cars, what Project Opel, or how the Corvette got its name, check out the *Fully Vetted* series!)

The NCM also provides a number of different outreach programs to open the wonderful world of Corvettes to the next generation of enthusiasts. These include setting up visits for Scout Troops (Scout members can even earn special patches during their visit), and educational field trips for schools that provide an experience encompassing history, engineering, and automotive innovation. Unfortunately, not all schools and students

can afford field trips, but you can help fund these trips with a tax deductible donation. You can fund an entire class for \$500, a grade level for \$1500, a school club for \$3000, a sport / academic team for \$5000, or an entire school for \$7500.
